Ahead of me is a time when this body, my body, will rest beneath the snow, waiting for the ultimate spring, a new heaven and a new earth. I have every reason to believe that it will rise just as Jesus rose from the dead. I expect it will be right on time. I can surely expect to be overwhelmed. And I think you can too. **The old life has gone, the new life has begun.**

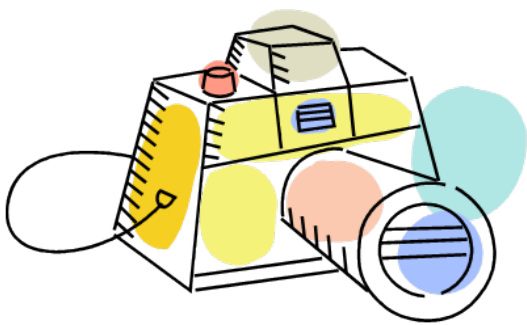
EASTER LILY DEDICATION

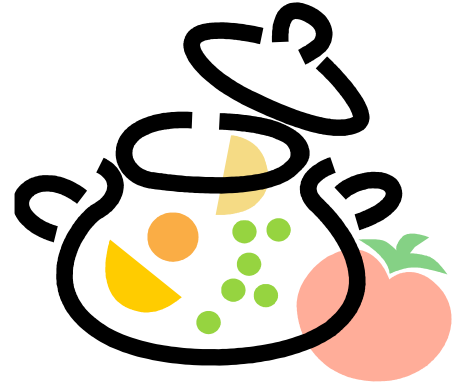

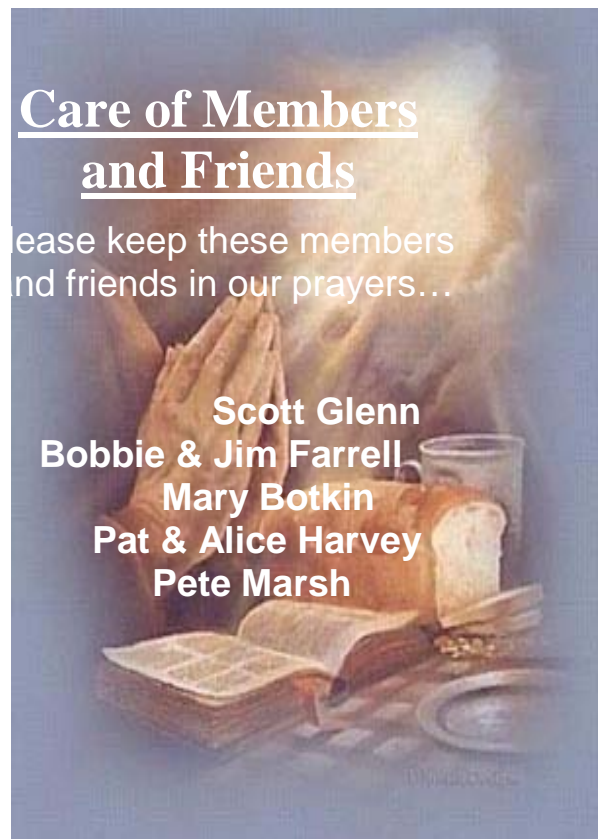

Death was no match for God!

The ancient Greek essayist Plutarch told the story of a man he knew who attempted to make a dead body stand upright. He tried various schemes finally giving up in disgust saying, "There is something missing on the inside." There certainly is. What is missing is the life God gives, and no one but God has ever found the secret of creating life. If God has given life once to us before we were born, what is to stop God from giving life once more, in other forms and other ways . after we are once dead? The philosopher/mathematician, Blaise Pascal (1623-1662) put it this way: *.What reason can people give for saying that we cannot rise again? Which is the more difficult . to be born, or to rise again? Is it more difficult to come into being than to return to it?. .Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen..*

A Declaration of Faith of The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) (Hebrews 11:1) affirms our assurance of what we hope for and yet have not seen . yet.

In the death of Jesus Christ

God's way in the world seemed finally defeated.

But death was no match for God.

The resurrection of Jesus was God's victory over death.

We do not yet see the end of death,

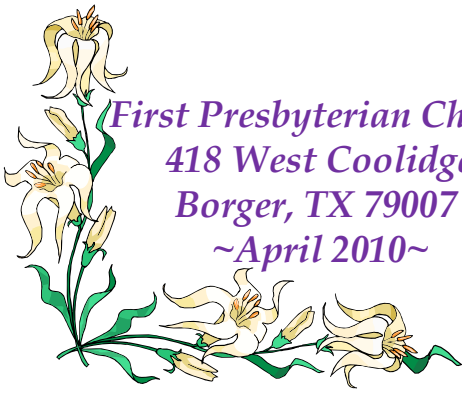
But Christ has been raised from the dead,
